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
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Executive Summary

- The Facility was within compliance for the month of October.
- Holding tank waste receiving resumed with lowered daily volume limits, no issues with loadings since.
- Working through Node 6 (Screening Building) punch list as items arise. Currently we are on manual slips due to printer communications. Also not logging to desktop computer.
- Basin Cleaning is complete.
- Diffusor inspection/repairs in progress.

Treatment Plant Aerial View




- 1. Modification of Holding Waste Receiving Currently in Effect:
 - Temporary Restrictions Due to High Volume and Schedule Non-Compliance:
 - Reason for Pause: We temporarily stopped receiving waste in holding tanks because
 of unusually high volumes at the end of December. This surge adversely affected the
 biological functioning of our plant.
 - Schedule Issues: Additionally, there were problems with haulers not following the designated offloading hours.
 - Compliance with NPDES Permit: It's important to note that during this entire period, the facility remained within all permit parameters.

- Resumption of Waste Acceptance with Modifications:
 - Stable Biological Processes: After confirming the stability of our plant's biological processes, we resumed accepting waste, albeit with certain adjustments.
 - Adjusted Daily Volume Limits: The amount of waste we accept daily is now at a three-load max from any one hauler. These limits will be adjusted based on our treatment capacity, and any changes promptly communicated to the haulers.
 - Reinforced Offloading Schedule: We have reiterated the importance of adhering to the offloading schedule to all haulers. Failure to comply may result in further suspension of their offloading privileges.
- 2. Windemuller has completed the PLC replacement of Nodes 2, 4 and 6. Punch list items are being addressed as they arise, mainly surrounding hauler waste meter receipts. It is important to note that the plant has been, and still is, in full operation during these process upgrades.




NPDES Permit Compliance

I am suggesting a slight increase in Seasonal Slip Rates, approximately %5.5 increase. Main marina from \$89 per ft. to \$94 per ft. with a flat rate of \$2350 for any boat 25' and under. The Coal Dock rate is suggested to increase as well at 2% with a rate of \$79 per ft. to \$84 per ft. with a flat rate of \$2100 for all boats 25' and under. This rate falls under schedule 3 of the Michigan Waterways Fee Schedule. I also suggest that we move from Schedule F (Michigan Waterways Fee Schedule) to Schedule G on transient rates. The cost would go from \$1.48 per ft. to \$1.60 per ft. The suggested Schedule G is what many other local marinas will be moving to or already have.

2025 Rate Schedules:

The 2025 Waterways Rate Schedules are attached. There were **no changes** from the 2024 rates.

The attached rate schedules provide the parameters for you to select the rate column that best fits the needs and amenities of your facility. Transient rates are based on the length of the vessel while seasonal rates are based on the length of the slip. Per your agreement with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), you are required to provide your chosen seasonal and transient rates annually. Please email your selected seasonal and transient rates for the 2025 season to Linnae Dawson (dawsonl@michigan.gov) by November 1, 2024.

PLEASE NOTE: If your location uses the <u>Central Reservation System (CAMIS)</u>, you must also copy **Jeremy Spell**, CRS analyst (<u>spellj@michigan.gov</u>) and the DNR Harbor support email box (<u>DNR-HarborSupport@michigan.gov</u>) on your rate email, to ensure your rates are built correct in the CAMIS system. Rates must be submitted **prior to your 6-month reservation window opening.**

If the attached rates are <u>not</u> adequate for your operations, please notify Linnae Dawson via email (<u>dawsonl@michigan.gov</u>) to discuss your needs.

Annual Reporting Requirements:

Per your agreement with DNR, you are also required to provide reports to the DNR.

At **the end of your fiscal year**, please **email** the attached Financial Summary of Operations to Kevin Klco KlcoK@michigan.gov

By the **end of the 2024 calendar year**, please **email** your Facility Information Sheet to both Kevin Klco (KlcoK@michigan.gov) and Linnae Dawson (dawsonl@michigan.gov)

Additional Reminders:

- All grant agreements require DNR approval for seasonal slips. If the DNR has
 previously approved seasonal slips at your facility, you may continue with those
 slips indefinitely unless there is a conditional term on the approval or as
 otherwise noted by the DNR.
- 2. Seasonal slip agreements, current seasonal assignments, seasonal waiting lists, as well as current and past transient harbor logs may be requested by the DNR at any time.
- 3. Requests for events, special uses, increased seasonal slips or commercial use need to be approved by the DNR. These activities may also need to go to the Michigan State Waterways Commission (MSWC) for review and advisement before being approved. The MSWC meets every other month. Requests need to be received at least 4 weeks prior to a scheduled meeting to be included on that meeting agenda so it is recommended that you submit requests as soon as possible to Linnae Dawson (dawsonl@michigan.gov).

PURPOSE

To discuss an increase in monthly water fees.

STAFF COMMENT

Elected officials are often tasked with having to make the difficult and often unpopular decisions on behalf of their constituents. The decision to raise water rates, following 17-years without raising rates, certainly falls into this category.

The State of Michigan has mandated that all communities are to replace qualifying water service lines over the next several years. To compound the issue, the Village will need to increase its water storage capabilities should we venture too far into our limited number of water taps remaining.

Although, we will continue our efforts to secure funding for these mandated improvements, we need to plan accordingly. Our approach is to incrementally adjust the rates over time to avoid a large increase that could otherwise be detrimental to those residents living on a fixed income.

Requesting a water rate study to address our future projects is encouraged, however, we should consider postponement of this effort until we have decided to move forward with a *specific* project, such as the mandated waterline replacement or water storage expansion or both. However, we are not likely to do that until the state and/or federal government begins recognizing communities in good standing and allowing us a fair opportunity to receive grants or even low interest loans. For the time being, we have enough information to suggest a calculated increase to our rates for 2025.

The proposed increase is based on meter size as has been the case. The majority of our businesses and residential units will experience a minimal increase of approximately \$4.00 per month, with larger meter users experiencing an increase upwards of \$100/month.

Provided below, are some options to consider as we work towards a recommendation to the Village Council.

- 1. Budget for a water rate study in 2025 and wait for the results of that study before raising rates.
- 2. Budget for a water rate study in 2025 yet **implement** the recommended rate increase described in this report.
- 3. **Postpone** the water rate study and move forward with the recommended increase described in this report.
- 4. Wait until 2026 to discuss raising the rates.
